What has the BNA done in the 2019/20 year?

Safer streets

There has been concern in different parts of Beckenham for some time about safety and noise around the streets (especially in relation to school children). We have been looking for ways to improve this, and this year have argued the case for some action at the Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board, and (just before lockdown) with Tim Scandrett, who was supportive. These initial discussions meant that in April (during lockdown) we were able to persuade the Council to apply for NZ Transport Agency money, which was successful (as notified in our last Newsletter). Repairs to Beckenham Park gates



Several years ago, the gates to the park were bent during other work, but nobody was taking any action to fix them. A long and determined campaign by several on the BNA committee was finally successful last month when the gates were removed to be straightened.

Other activities

Other activities included establishing contact after the City Council elections in October 2019 with our local Councillor Tim Scandrett, and local Community Board members. We kept an eye on the process when three older villas were removed for the expansion of Thorrington Village (Birdwood/Corson corner). We also supported the annual pre-Christmas barbeque/fair at Beckenham School on 12 December 2019.

Better Beckenham Project

This project is funded by a \$210,000 grant from the NZ Transport Agency in Wellington, aiming to use public spaces (roads and footpaths) to make better neighbourhoods. The project covers the Beckenham Loop, where its geographical limits (in a bend of the river), and low through traffic make some easy enhancements possible. Ideas already suggested for things to do include better road crossings, more seats on footpath and along river, and slower vehicle speeds, but we want your ideas too! The project is to be jointly run between the City Council and the residents, so please come along and have some input at the BNA AGM (or one of the other two information meetings/parties, at Beckenham School on 4 September from 3:15 pm and 6 September from 3 pm). Friends of Farnley Reserve

This small but lovely reserve runs along the riverbank just at the end of Palatine Terrace, extending behind the Centaurus Road shops. It had become quite overgrown, but last year a Friends of Farnley Reserve group was created, and has made a huge difference by tidying up and replanting in the reserve. On 16 August, 300 more plants were planted by the Friends, with so many volunteers present that it only took an hour.



Notable features of the reserve include a sculpture of tuna/eels in the central paved area, some very healthy kahikatea saplings, and a picturesque boat landing platform.
